# WELCOME

*The Editor, Andrzej Perkins*

Good afternoon all, and welcome to Wadham Lodge for this afternoon's Southern League game against Welwyn Garden City. We welcome their players, supporters and officials for their first visit to Wadham Lodge for a competitive game since October 2015, when they beat us in the FA Cup.

After a slow start, Welwyn have had some good results so far this season, and at one point were in the play-off positions. They've dropped off a little more recently, but a 3-0 win over FC Romania last weekend shows that they're not to be taken lightly.

It will be a reunion of sorts, with Welwyn managed by Max Mitchell, who is no stranger to Wadham Lodge having been our manager during the pandemic-hit 2020-21 season. Our own manager, Nicky Ironton, spent three successful years at Welwyn, ending with a play-off finish last season.

Last Saturday we picked up a point away to Biggleswade Town, one of the form-teams in the league. It could have been all three if Callum Ibe's header wasn't ruled out for offside (I'll let you be the judge with Bill Badger's photo on page seven). It seems that over the last few games luck just hasn't been on our side (Callum scoring with his face excepted). This isn't me saying "we was robbed, everyone's against us" - far from it; the table doesn't lie. If we'd have done enough to win, we'd have won, but just looking at the points we've dropped recently shows how close we are to mounting a play-off challenge, and how fine those margins are.

Biggleswade Town (drew): goal disallowed

If (and it's a very big if), we'd have taken seven more points from those games, we'd be fifth in the table. I don't think we deserved to be that high yet, but we're certainly building something. Hopefully a good run of form is just around the corner.

Stow bounced back from a heavy defeat away to Hertford with a well-earned point against Biggleswade Town. Despite playing most of the second half with ten men, Stow feel that they could have taken all three points from a game which they dominated.

Stow got onto the front foot early, and Kai Davis' sixth minute cross was almost tapped in by Bilal Sayoud, but it was well dealt with by the home defence. Stow were winning the midfield battle, and a monstrous header from Jack Green put in Callum Ibe down the left wing, but Max Granville recovered just in time to block the cross for a corner.

A goal was certainly coming, but it did so in strange fashion. Ibe chased down a back pass to Waders keeper Tommy Smith, who smashed it straight into the on-rushing Ibe's face, resulting in the ball rolling into the empty net.

The goal did spark some life into the home side, and former Stow forward Jon Clements should have done better when presented with a loose ball on the edge of the box. Moments later Stow had a golden opportunity to double their advantage, but Demaray Anyadike's cut-back was just behind Sayoud who was waiting for an easy tap-in.

Just six minutes into the second half, Stow's task got harder as Sayoud was shown a straight red card after tangling with Leon Brathwaite on the ground. Sayoud had little complaint, but the red card altered the pattern of the game, as the home side began to hit the deck with alarming frequency. They were rewarded just six minutes after the sending off, with Harry Draper heading back across goal an in.

But Stow continued to press, and Jack Green had a goal-bound effort blocked, before Callum Ibe had a goal disallowed for offence, to the bemusement of everyone in the ground, and the fury of Stow's players and management. Moments later, it was Waders' turn to have a goal disallowed, but judging by the scorer Clements' reaction, this one was far more clear-cut.

More chances fell Stow's way, with Ibe firing over when well-placed, and a couple of big goal-mouth scrambles, but as the game went into injury time, Stow settled for a point on the road. Dan Brock and Yannick Kissi showed great strength and determination to keep the ball by the Waders corner flag, and make sure they couldn't nick what would have been an undeserved victory.

As long-time readers of this programme will know, the histories of non-league teams are not what you'd call straightforward; something exemplified by the 3,000 word summary provided by today's visitors. Sadly, we don't have room to include it in full, so will do our best to summarise thus.

The early residents of the newly-founded garden city didn't waste any time in getting their boots on, with the football club being founded just a year after the first new home was completed in 1920. They initially played in the Mid-Herts League, before switching to the Bedfordshire & District for a season, and then the Spartan League.

But financial difficulties in 1934 (a deficit of £12 was reported by the Treasurer) meant a bizarre amalgamation with Shredded Wheat FC. The Spartan League had refused to admit any more works teams, so Welwyn kept their name and played there, while Shredded Wheat also kept their name and played in the South Midland League. It seemed like it was more a sharing of resources than a full amalgamation. In any case, the club folded a season later when Shredded Wheat withdrew the use of their facilities from the football club.

The club was re-established three years later, and bounced around local grounds (including playing back at Shredded Wheat!) before the Second World War put an end to WGC Mk 2. The third iteration came in 1944; and this was the most stable and long-running of the three. Spells in the Spartan, Herts County, London and Metropolitan Leagues followed, as did a merger with Welwyn Garden United in 1973.

The club's crowning achievement came in 2018, when they won the Spartan League and earned promotion to the step four for the first time in their history. After a rocky start, they stabilised under the management of Nicky Ironton in 2019, and were regular play-off challengers.





## THE BOSS MAX MITCHELL

*A man who will need little introduction in these parts, having managed us at the end of the 2019-20 and the 2020-21 season until it was cut short by the Covid-19 pandemic.*

*He started last season as our Director of Football, working closely with the youth and reserve teams, but then made the switch to Welwyn Garden City - initially as a player, but taking over the managerial reins at the start of this season.*

*He cut his managerial teeth at St Margaretsbury during their Essex Senior League days, impressive enough to earn him a job at Hertford Town in the Isthmian League, who he saved from relegation.*

*During his playing days, Mitchell came through the ranks at Arsenal before playing at Enfield Town, Wingate & Finchley, Cheshunt, Thamesmead Town and Avelly.*



## KEY PLAYER

### JOSH HUTCHINSON

*Formidable striker, who has chosen to make his comeback with WGC, after a year out of football. Had two prolific scoring spells with Potters Bar Town that earned him elevation to National League South football with firstly, Wealdstone and then Billericay Town. Much expected this season.*

**Charlie Crowley (goalkeeper):** Joined the club for the 20-21 season from Isthmian South Central club Waltham Abbey. Experienced keeper, who has also seen service with Wingate & Finchley and Hayes & Yeading. Virtually an ever present, was appointed club captain for the 2022-23 season.

**Ryan Doherty (defender):** Powerful young defender who is a product of the club's Under 23's side. Originally with Essex Senior Leaguers Hoddesdon Town, he has been a regular performer for the first-team in the last two seasons and goes from strength to strength.

**Lewis Franklin (full-back):** Teenage full-back signed midway through last season from Spartan South Midlands Leaguers Baldock Town for whom he was an ever present before joining WGC. A former Hitchin Town youth player, who spent time at Tottenham as a schoolboy. Top prospect.

**Aliou Njie (defender):** Has recently joined WGC permanently, having been with the club on a brief loan period from Isthmian Premier Wingate & Finchley three seasons ago. Was an Academy player with Championship club Blackpool, as a teenager.

**Joe Russell (defender):** Six foot three inch defender, who has joined WGC from fellow Div 1 Central outfit Romania. The Herts based defender also has experience with Cheshunt, now of National League South and step three club Haringey Borough.

**Tommy Fletcher (defender):** Recent signing from Walthamstow, where he starred for three seasons, half of them under manager Max Mitchell. Powerful defender who was a former pro with League 1 Wycombe Wanderers for two seasons and has also had senior non-league with both Bishop's Stortford and Chesham United.

**Gavin Hinds-Cadette (defender):** Experienced central defender or full-back, who has had experience with Aylesbury United, Berkhamsted and Harlow. Joined WGC from Enfield Borough, now of the Eastern Counties League.

**Harvey Steel (defender):** Sharp-tackling full-back who is a former Cambridge



## WE'VE MET BEFORE

There have only been two competitive meetings between the two clubs so far. The first was in October 2015 when The Citizens visited Wadhams Lodge for an FA Vase tie.

The game started well, With Abiola Balogun giving us the lead, but some good attacking play brought Welwyn level, then ahead before the break.

Dan Tulloch scored his only goal for the club to make it 2-2, but then a very soft penalty gave Welwyn the lead, which knocked the stuffing out of our young side. The game ended 5-2 to Welwyn.

The only other meeting came earlier this season, when goals from Demaray Anyadike, Lucas Schreiber and Ben Ward-Cochrane gave us an opening day win in Hertfordshire.

It was a victory which masked our problems though, and within a couple of weeks, managers John Mackie and Terry Spillane had been relieved of their duties.

**Max Jessop (midfield):** Very energetic, hard-working performer who joined from neighbours Colney Heath, after the Magpies were relegated from the Southern League last season. Players' player of the year while at his former club and previously with Hertford Town.

**Yasin Boodhoo (defender):** Highly popular player who is back at Herts Lane after three seasons with Colney Heath, Previously an ever-present with WGC in their successful Spartan South Midlands League days, playing in two Championship sides during his initial six seasons. Has also served London Colney.

**Carlos Flood (midfield):** Talented midfielder, who was with Isthmian Premier outfit Brightlingsea Regent last season. Prior to that spent 18 months with Hastag United. Clever footballer, who had trials with Football League Div 1 outfits Ipswich Town and Charlton Athletic as a youngster.

**Cheyce Grant (forward):** Early close season signing from Southern League Div 1 Central rivals Berkhamsted, where he starred last season. Very skilful and tricky winger, who has been really impressive in close season. Previously with Beaconsfield Town.

**Joe Dearman (forward):** Another ex-Cambridge United Academy product, who also joined from Wingate & Finchley. Left-sided forward or midfielder, who was formerly with St

Neots Town and Biggleswade Town. Was on Tottenham's books as a schoolboy.

**Jamie Smith (striker):** Versatile player, who joined having been with Romania last season. Can play in attack or defence and had a number of clubs before Romania, including London Colney, Colney Heath and the former Broxbourne Boro.

**Cyrus Babaie (forward):** Athletic, pacy forward, who has come through from the club's Under 23 side to claim a spot for the last two seasons. Began with Hoddesdon Town of the Essex Senior League. Very highly rated.

**Jack Vasey (forward):** Recently returned to the club from Ware. Local WGC boy, who previously played with Borehamwood, Bedford Town and Cambridge City before joining his home-town club. On leaving Herts Lane, he had a spell with Biggleswade Town, but is now back with the Citizens for a second spell.

**Jordan Kinoshi (forward):** Another WGC boy who has recently to play for his home-town club. A former Luton Town junior, who spent six seasons in the USA before returning to play at WGC. Left to join National League South St Albans City and has had further spells with Hitchin Town and Barton Rovers. Re-joined the Clarets from Berkhamsted.

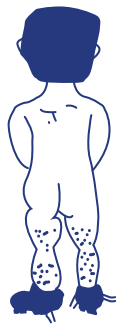

A warm welcome to one and all for this afternoon's game. Let's hope it's as good as last Saturday's at Biggleswade (but minus the linesman flagging for an offside that nobody else saw....). Pubwise, we got a real result after the game at the Golden Pheasant in the High Street - a lovely old low-beamed local with four handpumps and the bonus of locally-made pasties from a hot cabinet on the bar - an almost forgotten but much-missed sight in pubs these days.

Not everyone wants a full meal, and these provide a welcome halfway house between that and nuts or crisps. (See also the perspex dome covering a variety of filled rolls, still found in pubs in the Midlands).

Sadly our next Away trip, to Kempston Rovers, offers precious little on the beer front, though the club bar does offer Wells & Youngs Eagle IPA according to CAMRA's indispensable online guide,

[www.whatpub.com](http://www.whatpub.com).

Otherwise, within half a mile there's Daley's (Eagle IPA plus a guest), the Griffin (London Pride, Doom Bar plus a guest, light meals), both in Bedford Road, and the Smith's Arms in Margetts Road ("Kempston's answer to the Rover's Return, but with less drama - no real ale").

Or if you're getting a bus from Bedford, the Beer Hunter highly recommends the Wellington in (guess where) Wellington Street, and has had good reports of the Three Cups in Newnham Street.

Meanwhile, closer to home we promised you an update on the reopened Bell (corner of Chingford Road/Forest Road). It seems to be doing well, and attracting a wide-ranging clientele, with three handpumps alongside a range of kegs, meals, and sport on a number of TV screens. Not the same as before, therefore, but good luck to them.

# CLASSIC PROGRAMME

Today we extend a warm welcome to Welwyn Garden City FC for their first ever visit to Wadham Lodge. In recent years WGC we have met them in a couple of pre-season friendly fixtures, when they have beaten us both times, so not so friendly.

We have crossed swords just once before in the F A Vase 2nd Qualifying Round on 3rd October 2015 when once again, we were on the losing side.

Interesting history as Welwyn Garden City FC were founded in 1921 and began playing mainly friendlies, before joining the local leagues. Then they competed in the Spartan League, London League, Herts County League, back to the Spartan League which became the Spartan South Midlands at some point. Finally gaining promotion to the Southern League when they finished top in 2018.

Along the way they appear to have amalgamated with Shredded Wheat, a works team in 1934. As you know in the thirties works teams were not welcome in amateur leagues – it was believed they were paid when there were afternoon games, so could be thought of as professionals.

As its not worth digging up a past programme from less than ten years ago, I have gone for something much older, but from the Southern League. It is Leyton versus Northampton Town in the Southern League on Good Friday 14th April 1911. The match resulted in a win for Leyton by two goals to none.

Leyton's goals coming from George Ryder and Tommy Shanks. At the time we were lying in 6th position just below West Ham United, with the likes of Crystal Palace and Brighton & Hove Albion above them. We were also two points and one place ahead of Brentford (home supporters will appreciate the relevance of this).

However, Leyton went on to lose on Easter Saturday to Queens Park Rangers and then Northampton got their revenge on Easter Monday. Leyton finished seventh in the league, our highest ever placing.

Every other team in that league ended up in the Football League, many now playing in the Premiership. We were that close to getting on Sky TV.

Unfortunately, things off the pitch were not going so well. Leyton had that week just survived a winding-up order in the Courts. A petition had been brought about by a Mr Jones who claimed to have lent the club a hundred pounds and now wanted it back, The judge listened to reason and it was made clear to him that if the club were wound-up then there would be little prospect of any of the creditors being paid out.

We survived but the damage had been done. The costs of the legal action had to be borne by the club. The club did look at a possible libel action against the creditor but were told his words stated in court were allowed.

The following season Leyton finished bottom and faced the agonising prospect of dropping into the Second Division of the Southern League which apart from Stoke City also included seven Welsh clubs and with the increased travelling costs it really meant the end of the club.

# CALLUM



# 100 NOT

# WALTHEMSTOW

On the 19th of November 2022, Callum Ibe made his one hundredth appearance for Walthamstow; quite some achievement considering two of the last three seasons were cut short because of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Callum has been an ever-present in the Stow team since his debut in August 2019, standing by the club through thick and thin. During that time, he has deservedly become a real fans favourite, a cult hero and a legend on the terraces.

He has given everything for the cause, playing in pretty much every position on the field, except in goal. We look back at Cal's first 100.

Callum was one of the stand-out players in the 2018-19 Essex Senior League season, helping Stansted to a second-placed finish, and securing both the Essex Senior League Cup and the Gordon Brasted Trophy. He was their top scorer with 28 goals in 45 games, something which was impossible to ignore for then-Stow manager Ryan Maxwell.

Maxwell waited until three weeks into the season to make his move, poaching Ibe from title-rivals Stansted. It was perhaps not a coincidence that his first game was against Stansted. It was such a late switch, that Ibe was still listed as a Stansted player in the match programme.

And he made a good first impression at Wadham Lodge, setting up Dwade James for the only goal of the game in a Stow win. It was clear from the off that Callum was a player who would leave nothing out on the field, and scored his first goal a few weeks later with a spectacular overhead kick against Ilford.

But the game which told us we had a player of real talent, was away to Broadfields United in the FA Vase. On a torrid, wet day in west London, Callum put on one of Stow's performances of the season. Only minutes in, he robbed the full-back and set up Danny McCulloch who missed a sitter, was then fouled by the Broadfields keeper for a penalty (pictured right), forced a fine save from the keeper, set up James for his second, and somehow didn't get on the scoresheet himself. Broadfields resulted to trying to kick Callum off the park, but even that didn't work, drawing at least three bookings.

Callum was one of the few players to stay with the club after Ryan Maxwell's departure, and was key to new manager Max Mitchell's good start, scoring two in his first three games in charge.

Callum had 11 goals from 31 games when the

2019-20 season was brought to an abrupt end, and his form caught the eye of Bishops Stortford Manager Jamie Cureton, where he spent the 2020-21 pre-season, but he was soon lured back to Wadham Lodge, making his second debut in a 3-1 win away to Sporting Bengal United in the Essex Senior League.

After a couple of games in and out of the squad, Callum found his place on the left wing and was a near ever-present in Max Mitchell's side, which after making a stuttering start to the season, was firing on all cylinders when another campaign was cut short due to Covid-19. Callum scored nine in 15 that season, and had one of the best win-percentages of anyone in Max Mitchell's side. The only two games Callum lost were against



Hornchurch in the FA Cup when Vinny Murphy got sent off after a quarter of an hour, and against Hoddesdon Town, where our defence had a night off in a 4-2 defeat.

Lasting from December 2020 to August 2021, the longest pre-season ever and the departure of Max Mitchell from Wadham Lodge meant the Stow team were in something of a state of flux. Callum ended up at Bishop's Stortford ground again, but this time playing for Enfield with about ten other former Stow boys. But he never fully settled at the Es, and when the chance to join Stow for a

third time came up, neither side could say no. His return came in October, coming off the bench to score against Stanway Rovers. From then on, he was a near ever-present in John Mackie and Terry Spillane's side which would memorably win the Essex Senior League title. The moment of the 2021 season, for supporters and probably Callum alike was in the middle of January when Enfield visited Wadham Lodge. With 96 minutes played, and the game seemingly heading for a draw, Callum was in the right place at the right time to deftly head Samir Bihmoutine's cross home.



In the reverse fixture, the Enfield 'DJ' played Neil Diamond's *Sweet Caroline* over the PA, a snakey move, given the Rabble's *Sweet Callum* be rendition of the song. But the goal at Wadham Lodge meant Callum had the last laugh, effectively ending Enfield's title challenge, and pretty much securing the championship for Stow, despite it being January.

The win against Enfield was a huge point in the season, as was the 1-0 victory over Redbridge which preceded it, but there was still work to be done. At a time in the season when legs were starting to tire, and there was a sense that the job was done, it was Callum who got Stow over the line. Man of the match performances against Athletic Newham and Sawbridgeworth Town were followed-up by a hatrick against Clapton, and a goal and a couple of assists against Woodford Town. The Woodford victory was enough to secure the title, with Stansted losing their next game.



And this season, Callum has gone from strength to strength. Manager Nicky Ironton has re-lit that fire, and playing in a slightly deeper role, Callum has been playing his best football since joining four years ago. This was typified by his performance against Biggleswade Town last Saturday. He scored, chasing a lost cause and forcing the Town goalkeeper to smash a clearance straight into him, and then had a perfectly good goal disallowed. Playing most of the second half with ten men, Callum did the running and work of three men, let alone two, and didn't give the Biggleswade defence a moment to themselves. It was another incredible performance, but one which we have come to expect from a fantastic footballer, and an even better person. He'll always be a true Stow legend. Well done Cal, and here's to 100 more.

# WORK AND PLAY: ENGLISH FOOTBALL'S INDUSTRIAL ROOTS

**L**ast January, Alsager Town hosted Vauxhall Motors in a North West Counties Football League Division One South match. It was a cool autumn evening, but the football kept the hundred or so spectators warm.

Two honest sides gave it their all, with plenty of entertainment and no little controversy, with the struggling home side matching the Motormen the division's early pacesetters all the way. Vauxhall Motors took the points, winning the game 1-0, but Alsager Town could point to a harshly disallowed goal and their best performance for a while. It was a great game, and a great advert for the semi-pro game.

A visit from Vauxhall Motors is always interesting. Even before becoming involved in the semi-pro game, I'd always kept an eye out for their results mainly due to their quirky name and the club's history.

Vauxhall Motors was formed in 1963 following the opening of the Vauxhall Motors car plant in Ellesmere Port becoming the plant's works team, initially playing in local leagues before becoming the town's "local" club despite the presence of Ellesmere Port and Ellesmere Port Town. The club eventually made its way into the semi-pro leagues, rising up to what is now the National League, and making the Second Round proper of the FA Cup, beating Queens Park Rangers in the First Round.

The legendary Stoke City manager Tony Waddington said that football is the "working man's ballet", and while he was referring to the working man as spectator, when you begin to scratch beneath the surface of the game, you begin to understand that it is much more than that. Sometimes a team is much closer to the working man.

There are currently nine clubs competing in the Premier League or Football League that originated from works teams, while in the football pyramid below the Football League, there are a further ninety-seven clubs that originate from industries as diverse as mining, munitions, railway engineering, the police force, and financial services. Before the decline of industry, there were hundreds more, clubs formed to provide workers with exercise and entertainment.

The country's most famous works team or former works team is, of course, Manchester United, who were formed in 1878 as Newton Heath LYR by workers at the Newton Heath depot of the



Lancashire and Yorkshire Railway. The club's original colours were green and gold - the colours of the railway company - which Manchester United have used as change colours during the Premier League era, while supporters protesting the Glazer brothers' involvement in the club have used green and gold scarves to register their displeasure at how the club has been run.

The Premier League is home to three other former works teams: Arsenal, West Bromwich Albion, and West Ham United.



Arsenal were born in 1886 when fifteen workers at the Royal Arsenal munitions factory formed Dial Square, which is where they worked at the heart of the Royal Arsenal complex. They very quickly renamed the club Royal Arsenal and became the first London club to turn professional (pictured above). The club changed their name for a second time in 1893, becoming Woolwich Arsenal, and went on to become the first southern member of the Football League. In 1913, they were relegated to the Second Division and took the decision to move to the new Arsenal Stadium in Highbury. Twelve months later, they changed their name for a third time to The Arsenal. The club dropped the "The" from their moniker two years later.

Arsenal's fellow London club West Ham United followed in 1895, founded by Arnold Hills, owner of the Thames Ironworks and Shipbuilding Company,

and his foreman, Dave Taylor. The club was originally named Thames Ironworks FC and informally merged with Castle Swifts, who were Essex's first professional team. For the first three years of their existence, Thames Ironworks competed on an amateur basis, turning professional in 1898 when they joined the Southern League Second Division. Thames Ironworks folded in June 1900 due to financial issues and disputes over the running of the club, but a month later, the club was reformed under the name West Ham United FC.

Not many people may realise it, and there aren't much in the way of clues in the club's name, but West Bromwich Albion also began life as a works team. Founded in 1878 as West Bromwich Strollers, the club's founding fathers were a group of workers from George Salter's Spring Works, a firm that made the first spring scales in Britain. The club was renamed West Bromwich Albion in 1880, becoming the first club to use Albion in their name. Just as the football club continues to thrive, Salter Housewares - as George Salter's old firm is now known - thrives too, and continues to manufacture kitchen accessories which are sold all over the world.

Outside of the Premier League, former works teams are Coventry City, who were formerly known as Singers FC, Singers manufactured cycles. Millwall were founded in 1885 as Millwall Rovers by workers from JT Morton's canning and preserve factory on the Isle of Dogs. Wycombe Wanderers were formed in 1887 by a group of young furniture tradesmen, and both Doncaster Rovers and Stoke City were formed by railway workers.

But the vast majority of former works teams that are still around can be found beneath the Football League in the lower reaches of the football pyramid.



As with Vauxhall Motors, Avro compete in the North West Counties League after spending most of their existence in the Manchester League. They were founded in 1936 by a group of workers at the Failsworth factory of the British aircraft manufacturer Avro, though the club now plays its football in nearby Oldham at the Whitebank Stadium.

One of English football's most curiously named clubs can be found in the North East. Billingham Synthonia play in the Northern League Division Two, the tenth tier of the football pyramid, and I'm fairly confident that they are the only football club in the world named after an agricultural fertiliser. The product was manufactured by ICI, who the team was once associated with, and provided the club with their home. The Synners,

as they are known, were formed in 1923, and have a decent pedigree at this level of the game, winning the Northern League Division One title on four occasions, and reaching the First Round proper of the FA Cup seven times. The club traditionally played their football at Belasis Lane (pictured above), which was part of the ICI sports ground, a ground that hosted the North's first floodlit game when the Synners beat an RAF team 8-4 on 11th November 1952 in front of 3,000 spectators. However, they left Belasis Lane in 2017 due to the high cost of required upgrading works and now play their football at the Norton Sports Complex, a few miles out of town. The team is currently managed by former Middlesbrough and Manchester City midfielder Jamie Pollock.

Back in the North West, one of the semi-pro game's longest established names is Cammell Laird, or Cammell Laird 1907 as they are now known. The Cammells were established in 1907 as Cammell Laird Institute Association Football Club and were the works team of the Cammell Laird shipbuilding company in Birkenhead. The club still plays their football in Birkenhead at Kirklands and compete in Division One South of the North West Counties Football League, and are one of the league's most decorated clubs.

Elsewhere on Merseyside, Pilkington of Division One North of the North West Counties Football League were formed in 1938 and originate from the famous Pilkington Glass factory in St Helens. And in nearby Prescot, Prescot Cables were formed in 1884, and though strictly not a works team, took their name from the largest employer in the town, British Insulated Cables. Prescot Cables compete in the Northern Premier League Division One North West and are now a supporter-owned club.

In the Midlands, the exotically named Coventry Sphinx was formed in 1946 as the works team of the Armstrong Siddeley engineering company who specialised in luxury vehicles and aircraft engines. They were originally known as Armstrong Siddeley Motors Football Club, changing their name to Sphinx Football Club in 1960. They became known by their current name in 1995 when they won promotion to the Midland Combination Premier Division.

One of the most prominent semi-pro sides in recent times, thanks to the exploits of one of its former players, is Stocksbridge Park Steels of the Northern Premier League First Division South East. The player in question is, of course, Jamie Vardy, who joined the Steels after being released by Sheffield Wednesday as a youngster. Vardy has achieved big

things since leaving Bracken Moor, winning the Premier League and the Golden Boot with Leicester City, and winning numerous England caps, and the club's main stand is named after him. Stocksbridge Park Steels was formed in 1986 when the works team of the local British Steel plant merged with another local club, Oxley Park Sports.

Coal mining was once upon a time one of the country's most important industries, producing the fuel that powered the nation, and collieries across the Midlands and the North produced dozens of works teams. But while the mining industry disappeared, many of the former works teams are still alive and kicking, in clubs like Atherton Collieries, Bedlington Terriers, Coalville Town, Frickley Athletic, Maltby Main, Pontefract Collieries, and Nostell Miners Welfare.

Over the past three decades, football has been increasingly taken away from working-class people, particularly when it comes to the upper echelons of the game, which has become a gentrified "product". But at semi-pro and grassroots level, there is still a thriving movement which works teams play a big part of. Of course, the vast majority of those works teams are works teams in name only; but their players, the club officials, the volunteers that keep them going, and their supporters are working-class people that keep English football's grassroots strong.

Those former works teams that sit around the game's top table may be completely detached from their roots, but there are still dozens around the country that are truly rooted in the communities in which they were born, providing opportunities for working people to remain involved in the national game.
